


# **Stepping Up to Serve Students**


Along with Homework Help, the Clay Middle School afterschool staff are providing students with many enrichment opportunities on Microsoft Teams.

Promise Scholarship Info: If you teach or know seniors, help us get this information out to them. Thanks!! **PROMISE Scholarship Information** 

The WV Higher Education Policy Commission (HEPC) would like to clarify two misconceptions regarding the 2021 PROMISE Scholarship application for the class of 2021.

- 1. Students must submit both the PROMISE Scholarship Application and 2021-2022 FAFSA by March 1, 2021. The HEPC will not be implementing the new WVSAM system for the 2021 PROMISE application year. Schools should not wait to utilize the new WVSAM system before they ask students to submit the 2021 PROMISE application. Current PROMISE applicant numbers are drastically down so please encourage all 2021 graduating seniors to submit the PROMISE Scholarship application at cfwv.com/promise and FAFSA at fafsa.gov as soon as possible. Submissions should be received no later than March 1, 2021.
- 2. Class of 2021 seniors should submit the 2021 PROMISE Scholarship application whether they currently have a qualifying ACT/SAT test score or not. 2021 applicants have until August 2021 to meet the ACT/SAT test score requirement. All applicants must meet the March 1, 2021, deadline to be guaranteed an award for fall 2021. Students should NOT wait to submit the application until an eligible ACT/SAT test score is achieved.



### **Securing Resources for Students**

In December three grants were awarded to the Clay Afterschool Program to help support students. Two supplemental grants were provided through the West Virginia Department of Education program in the amounts of \$10,500 each to purchase educational board and card games for elementary students to enjoy at home. A No Kid Hungry Grant in the amount of \$42,600 was also awarded to the program to provide additional take-home meals for afterschool students.
