The final year of the 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC grant received by Clay County Schools for 2017-2022 saw many students participate in afterschool and summer programming.

- 363 Elementary Students
- 391 Middle/High Students



### Summer Learning Program 2021-2022

- 115 Elementary Students
- 120 Middle/High Students



## Regular Afterschool Attendees See Improvements

Indicator	Goal	CCS Results
Maintained or improved reading grade from fall to spring	50%	100%
Maintained or improved math grades from fall to spring	50%	63%
Increased proficiency on the WVGSA in Reading/ELA	45%	49%
Increased proficiency on the WVGSA in Math	30%	48%
Increased homework completion, classroom participation, and attendance	75%	76%

\*Regular Attendees = Students who participated 30 or more days

\*\*WVGSA = West Virginia General Summative Assessment (State standardized test to gauge student proficiency in reading and math)

## **Summer Learning Program Creates Opportunities for Students**

**The Clay County Schools Summer Learning Program, offered for six weeks in June and July, provided many wonderful opportunities for students. From hiking the Elk River Trail to visiting Hovatter's Zoo in Preston County to completing STEM-related crafts at the Clay County Public Library, elementary students not only received academic support in reading and math, they also had the chance to explore, create, and learn more about the world around them. Amazingly, 246 books were read over the six-week period by these busy students!**

**Seventeen different enrichment sessions were available to middle and high school students over a five-week period. From gardening to art to welding and electrical wiring to steel drums to photography and blacksmithing, many new experiences awaited students. Additionally, 18 credits were earned by credit recovery program students wanting to stay on track for graduation.**
