The Clay County Schools Summer Learning Program, offered for six weeks in June and July, provided many wonderful opportunities for students. From hiking the Elk River Trail to visiting Hovatter's Zoo in Preston County to completing STEM-related crafts at the Clay County Public Library, elementary students not only received academic support in reading and math, they also had the chance to explore, create, and learn more about the world around them. Amazingly, 246 books were read over the six-week period by these busy students!

Seventeen different enrichment sessions were available to middle and high school students over a five-week period. From gardening to art to welding and electrical wiring to steel drums to photography and blacksmithing, many new experiences awaited students. Additionally, 18 credits were earned by credit recovery program students wanting to stay on track for graduation.
